I also would like to welcome all Aboriginal students here today.

Peer Tutoring =

A peer tutor training program was re-implemented this year at Murrumburrah High School. It had been a great success a number of years ago.

The program involved students in Year 10 completing an accredited TAFE course in literacy tutoring and providing support for selected Year 7 students.

The TAFE training program focuses on teaching the tutors the basics of instruction and teaching. The program was delivered by Karen Ward both at Murrumburrah High School and at Young TAFE. Even if a student understands the subject material well, it is not always easy to communicate the material to others. By training students and teaching the basic skills that a tutor needs to instruct, ensures the tutors have the skills to assist students with a wide range of reading skills

The Year 10 tutors complete modules in theory (TAFE training) and tutoring sessions three times per week in IVY time. They assist their selected students to improve their reading skills by using novels and reading material from the library at their appropriate reading level.

This program has many academic, social and welfare benefits for both tutor and their chosen student with the tutors and tutees getting to know each other well over the year. The program has an outstanding record of success in enhancing the students' reading levels and confidence in reading as well as providing many useful reading and comprehension skills for the tutors.


It is proposed that in 2021, Year 10 students will be given the opportunity to train as tutors.

Industrial Technology Timber

The two projects complete this semester were the folding chair and wall mirror. The folding chair project required accurate measurements, skill in cutting material and the use of a range of electric power tools to complete the project. The wall mirror introduced students to the use templates/jigs with the router to create decorative pediments and for the process of mass production. Mirrors are of a standard size and students are given the freedom to design their own top and bottom sections and any other modifications they feel necessary.





Industrial Technology Metal

In metalwork this semester students completed a number of metal fabrication projects; Year 9 students manufactured a rocket stove and Year 10 students a camping BBQ developing their skills using fabrication techniques and the MIG welder. The students also produced sheet metal projects completing a dust pan, tool carryall and advanced tool tin. The students used the guillotine, magnabend and developed sheet metal skills of accurate marking out and engineering drawing interpretation.

Farm News =

The Babies have arrived.

The busy shorthorn mothers have rewarded the students with calves as an early Christmas present. Nancy was first to calve a beautiful red bull calf. Popstar, our heifer cow, was next to easily calve a beautiful red heifer calf. While writing this we are still waiting for the matriarch Shorty to deliver her calf.

Our four heifers that were artificially inseminated (AI) do not appear to have returned to heat. So fingers crossed, they are all in calf. We are looking into doing a tail blood test to confirm pregnancy as a new learning tool in the next month or so when the students are back from summer holidays. If all is how it should be, the students will be expecting four new calves at the end of August.

The colour and sex of the calf competition continues in Senior Ag while we wait for Shorty to deliver. Punnet squares for genetic traits are being drawn up to determine the genotype and phenotype of the calves in relation to coat colour.

Last week our trusty shearer Doug Baker arrived at the school with his new shearing sheep handler. This was a first for Murrumburrah High School and we were excited to see how easily the handler held the sheep while moving it around to be shorn at waist height by Doug. This enabled the rams to be shorn without any ram sedative which had them back with the ewes for joining with no delays or groggy heads.

Doug also completed the shearing of our new six SAMM ewes which we purchased from Peter and Kath Manwaring. Now all ewes are in sync with wool production and joining times. We expect a drop of late autumn lambs in 2021.

With Wal backlining the ewes this week, all is set for a summer of grazing for the students' sheep flock during the holidays.

The School Farm has a large number of pasture hay to sell at \$50 a large round bale. All baled with no rain damage.
