

Stage 4 Science is learning about Forces and Electricity, and all classes have been doing experiments to further understand the types of forces.

Dropping balls, bottles of various weights and other shapes demonstrated the effect of the non contact force of gravity.

Magnetism is another form of a non contact force and the photo shows the field lines around a magnet using iron filings.

Electrostatic force is the other non contact force and classes have been observing this with teachers demonstrating using the Van de Graff generator.


Science in the Technology Lab

During last week in the newly upgraded Technology Lab, classes from Mr Clancy's **Stage 4** and **5** Science trialled some of the new Lego Spike robotics kits. These kits include a robotic brain, lots of sensors, three motors, and many attachments. Once a robot is designed and created, it can be coded from students' laptops to follow any instructions they have selected.

During the earlier lessons, Stage 5 worked in groups to create a simple driving base that could be programmed to go around a basic corner, this culminated in a six-robot race in the corridors of the school. Student's then extended their knowledge to race their robots around a series of obstacles using the distance sensors to avoid collisions.

Stage 4 begin by building a simple crawling robot which they would race against their classmates; students where to engineer this robot in any way they could to achieve an advantage, the only rule being, no wheels allowed! Stage 4 quickly progressed from this, to using a driving base as a platform to engage in a full-on robot war knockout.

We are looking at opening the Technology Lab during some breaks so students can develop their skill, or just come along for some fun.


In the next couple of weeks we will be delving further into our dream jobs/careers, resume writing and how to apply for different types of jobs.

To get started, simply use the attached username and password, and login at <u>www.mangahigh.com</u>. You can use Mangahigh on a PC, laptop, tablet or smartphone.

ACTIVITIES ON MANGAHIGH

On Mangahigh, the 'assigned' section consists of activities assigned by the teacher. The 'recommended' activities are personalised to support your child's individual learning - these should be regularly completed as well.

CHECKING PROGRESS

Your child can check their own progress by clicking on their name, then the PROGRESS tab. This shows how much time they have spent on Mangahigh, the % assignment pass rate and also the number of 'medals' earned.






BRONZE MEDAL

Successful completion of work on Mangahigh is measured by medal achievements. To earn a Bronze medal (the minimum requirement), students will need to answer 4+ Hard questions correctly in the learning quizzes. Make sure your child reviews any mistakes (red boxes) before attempting the activity again. Encourage your child to attempt each activity at least 3 times.
