Principal's Report

Hello again and welcome back to our regular newsletter routine.

It is great to be back at work and some relatively normal operations. After speaking to many of our staff and students...... and many parents, I think it is safe to say that everyone is happy for school to be back and operational and that home learning has come to another end. For the last time we all hope.

After having the last week of Term 3 back in class we all had a bit of a scare with a local lock-down over the holiday break but thanks to the community testing and doing the correct thing we came out of that lock-down just before school returned. It really was good to be able to restart Term 4. My own opinion at this stage is that we will probably remain at Level 3 school restrictions for a while, if not the rest of the year. We are all very much hoping that next year starts at Level 2 and that excursions, sporting teams, trips away etc. can all resume.

This term we have three pre-service teachers starting at the school and working with us for 8 weeks. The three staff are from the University of Sydney and after adhering closely to all testing and restrictions have settled in to delivering lessons and getting the feel of how a rural high school operates. As many of our community may be aware Mr Michael Clancy (our science and physics teacher) took up work in Sydney to be with family. We all wish him the best in his change of location in the current climate but know that he is happy and still working full time. Department of Education has been unable to secure a replacement yet, but we have some plans in place for 2022. Mr Clancy's classes are being covered by a range of teachers currently working at the school who have kindly offered to do additional lessons to make sure that our students have a teacher in front of them. It is a true sign of our community that people just step up when needed and offer their assistance.

Whilst I am talking about staff, many people might already be aware that we had a new position allocated to the school during the last lock-down. A Student Support Officer (SSO) has been created as a full time permanent position. The position was advertised state wide and our own local Sarah Jones was successful at being offered the position. Sarah's role will be totally connected to supporting students and looking after wellbeing and welfare needs.

I met with our new Captains today and delivered the good news to them. I thank everyone that nominated and know that they understand that not everyone gets to be Captain. Our new Captains will do a superb job and I look forward to working more closely with them over the coming year and hope that with restrictions probably easing next year that they can contribute to the many Captains opportunities they will have to represent the school.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Optional advice:

Student will be asked to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a computer to enable them to hear audio during the assessment. Earbuds used for mobile phones or other portable devices may be suitable for use during the assessment. The type of computer connection needed is a jack or USB.

Students are also able to use a calculator.

The artwork assists the audience to create a sense of sympathy and compassion for those who are placed in the spotlight. 'Fee of Fame' showcases what people perceived Matthew Perry as whilst he was in the spotlight, little did anyone know the personal struggles he was experiencing at the cost of fame. This later affected both his mental and physical appearance throughout his life."



Stage 4 History - Ancient China

Our Year 7 and 8 History students are currently studying ancient China with a view to understanding one of the most ancient cultures in the world. The ancient Chinese invented many of the products we still use today – paper money, tea, seismic earthquake detectors, the compass, the umbrella, fireworks, gun powder, porcelain and the toothbrush among other products. They were also highly skilled in creating figurines out of bronze and jade and discovered how to produce silk. The 1st Emperor of China, Qin Shi Huangdi (220-206 BCE) was responsible for joining stretches of the Great Wall and his tomb, discovered in 1974 by farmers digging a well, revealed the Terracotta Warriors.

Our class examined objects bought home from staff visits to China. While these objects were created with modern technologies, they are all modelled on ancient traditional objects, except the terracotta and resin object showing one of the excavated pits of the Terracotta Warriors.

Investigating with Mathematics, aims to promote interest in mathematics and foster positive attitudes amongst students, teachers and parents.

The purpose of the investigation is to explore 'real-life' situations and problems that engage students and teachers in mathematics. It involves students formulating their own questions from a given situation.

Investigating with Mathematics tasks meet Working Mathematically syllabus outcomes as well as outcomes in the strands in which the investigation takes place.

All students from Kindergarten to Year 10 in NSW are eligible to enter.

Mitch Summerfield accepted the award on behalf of the class In week 10 last term via an on line award ceremony. Students will be presented with their awards once we are able to hold formal assemblies.

Thank you to Zoe and Will McCarthy who donated chooks to the school last last term.


The veggie patches are looking fabulous on the farm, last term the students also planted a strawberry patch in the school grounds.


