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> Principal's Report >

Hello again and welcome to our last newsletter from Term 1.

It has now been 4 weeks since our last printed newsletter and from all reports it is just as popular as ever. Now that the school is back to normal and students are undertaking more out of class activities and face to face learning is normal, we have lots to fill our reports with for the community to read. Well over 150 newsletters are printed and still growing as we get more requests.

I have spent most of my time over the last 4 weeks on a number of administrative tasks that, even though time consuming, are all vital to the functioning of the school. The first was writing our schools annual report. This report reflects how the school met our goals for progress, how our finances have been spent, and a few shorter reports showing selective data from mandatory reporting guidelines. This report has been completed and uploaded to our school's website should anyone like to have a closer look.

The second task, which was started by the school executive in Term 4 last year, was to undertake a full evaluation of the school's performance over the last 3 years in relation to the school plan. This process was called a Situational Analysis. A lovely title that simply means how well we did and what we need to do in the future. Unfortunately, for this evaluation to be accurate, it takes weeks to undertake.... but it is now done. Part of this process is to take what we know about the school's progress in 2020 and compare it against the School Excellence Framework. This then shows us how we are tracking in line with state expectations.

The last step was to create our new School Improvement Plan to be applied over the next four-year cycle. The School Improvement Plan (or SIP as we know it as) has to take all the data gathered from the situational analysis, combined with the funding the school gets each year, to create a comprehensive plan that targets the needs of the students. Some of these targets are mandatory this cycle and are heavily based around literacy and numeracy results, NAPLAN performance, attendance and HSC performance. Other targets come from the analysis work done and then all of them must have specific activities aligned, with funding and resourcing attached, to show what we are doing, how will we evaluate our successes and what are we planning into the future of the SIP.

I am sorry for the explanation and all the terminology, but it is a vital part of what I do, and given how long it takes to prepare I thought it important to share with you all. In the end what we do and how well we plan, directly and positively effects all the staff and their work and the students and their outcomes, both academically and socially which is why we are all here in the first place.

Finally, I would like to wish everyone a happy Easter and hope you all have a safe and enjoyable time away from school. Remember to stay COVID safe.

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= English =

Our English classrooms have been a hive of creativity this term as students in all classes have been working on composing pieces of extended writing. **Year 12** have been writing argumentative essays on their set text *Henry Lawson*. They were required to argue a point about Henry Lawson's depiction of characters and their identity.

Year 11 students have been dipping their toes into creative writing looking at both imaginative and non-imaginative styles, producing their own pieces and reflecting on the process. Some writing from Year 11 Advanced English features in this edition.

Stage 5 explored texts relating to conflict and used visual stimulus to write their own creative pieces.

Stage 4 have been studying the memoir *Chinese Cinderella* and have used this as a stimulus to do some writing about their own lives in diary form.

Students are also encouraged to get involved in the Jugiong Writer's Festival writing competition which is advertised at school. If students would like to contribute pieces they should do so via their English teacher. Students have also had the opportunity to enter into write4fun and the Dorothea Mackellar poetry competition. This rush of creativity will culminate in the writers workshop next term. More on that to come.

In conjunction with the Jugiong Writer's Festival, Murrumburrah High School will host young fiction writer Jane Carroll to our school on Wednesday 21st April to run creative writing workshops with groups of our students.

From the website: In Jane's workshops students work on short intensive pieces to achieve specific goals and discover techniques. In doing so the students find they can produce memorable writing that connects with the reader. If and when the writer is ready to write a whole story s/he will continually reinforce and develop those techniques that have been used with such success and enjoyment in the shorter pieces. A story may be the culmination rather than the starting point in achieving the writer's primary goal of connecting with the reader.


