Principal's Report

Welcome to Week 6.

Since our last newsletter I have been involved in a few activities that help the school and its community. Ms Hyland and myself attended the Principals Forum at Young PCYC. This meeting was held once again since lockdown last year and is used as a time to plan events, support and explain past areas of interest that may affect our community. It was good to touch base with the local Police and other schools that attended.

Last year we introduced a peer reading program. This program involved Year 10 students being trained by TAFE staff and meeting one on one with a Year 7 student to assist with reading improvement. This program was very well received by the students last year and very productive. This year, 7 students from Year 10 attended TAFE to undertake their first training day. In week 5 they then met with their Year 7 students and began the program of support. So far things are going along very nicely and the Year 10 students will have 2 more TAFE training sessions over the next 2 weeks.

CSU in Wagga invited Mrs Spencer (Careers Adviser), Ms Hyland (Deputy Principal) and myself along for a formal dinner in Wagga held on the University grounds. The dinner was a restart of the Principals dinner forum that was held almost 2 years ago. At these functions many high schools from the Wagga area attend and are presented with information and a lovely meal. Attendees then had a Q and A session and a good chance to mingle and share useful ideas with each other that can help our senior students back at school. A long drive after work but a great night.

NAPLAN examinations have been undertaken by our Year 7 and Year 9 students. These mandatory exams give the Department and the school a snapshot of each student's progress compared to all state students, at that point in time. Results should be back soon.

After a successful relaunch of our Business Brekky program last Thursday the school has received many positive comments for their work supporting local businesses in apprenticeships/traineeship information. The presenters provided a brief overview of how they can support local businesses and options that they have available to them. A big thank you to Karen at the Light Horse Hotel for catering for 21 people at 7.30 in the morning. A lovely venue, a warm fire and a great breakfast.

Zoe Robinson, who is the Advocate for Family and Young People in NSW visited our school recently to get a chance to talk directly to a few of our students about aspects of country life that she might be able to help with. Zoe had a brief tour of the school and loved her chance to touch base with rural families. Zoe also was at a meet and greet lunch at Wallendbeen Public School that Ms Hyland and I attended.

Finally, a quick infrastructure update. The balcony roof is currently being planned and designed to meet Departmental guidelines, the car park extension has been measured up by the company from Wagga and is awaiting final approvals, the school will be getting a full solar panel upgrade as part of the cooler classrooms project. When the air conditioning units are installed and the gas heating removed this should make a big saving on energy consumption.

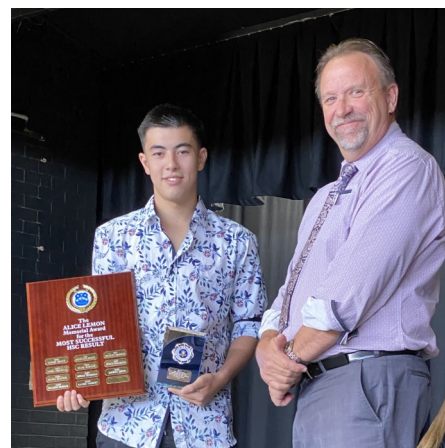


÷ Alice Lemon Memorial Award ÷

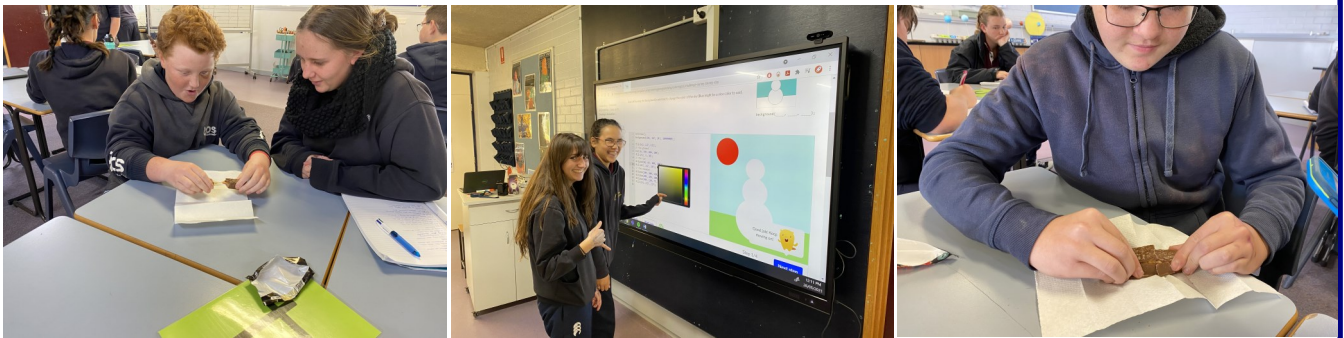


Science

Stage 4 Science

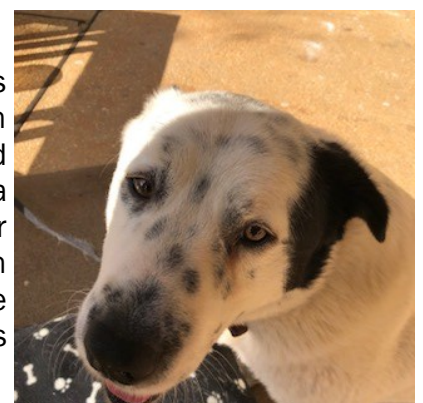
In Stage 4 students have been exploring the earth, sun and moon. They have just completed a stop motion project describing the motion of the planets around the sun.

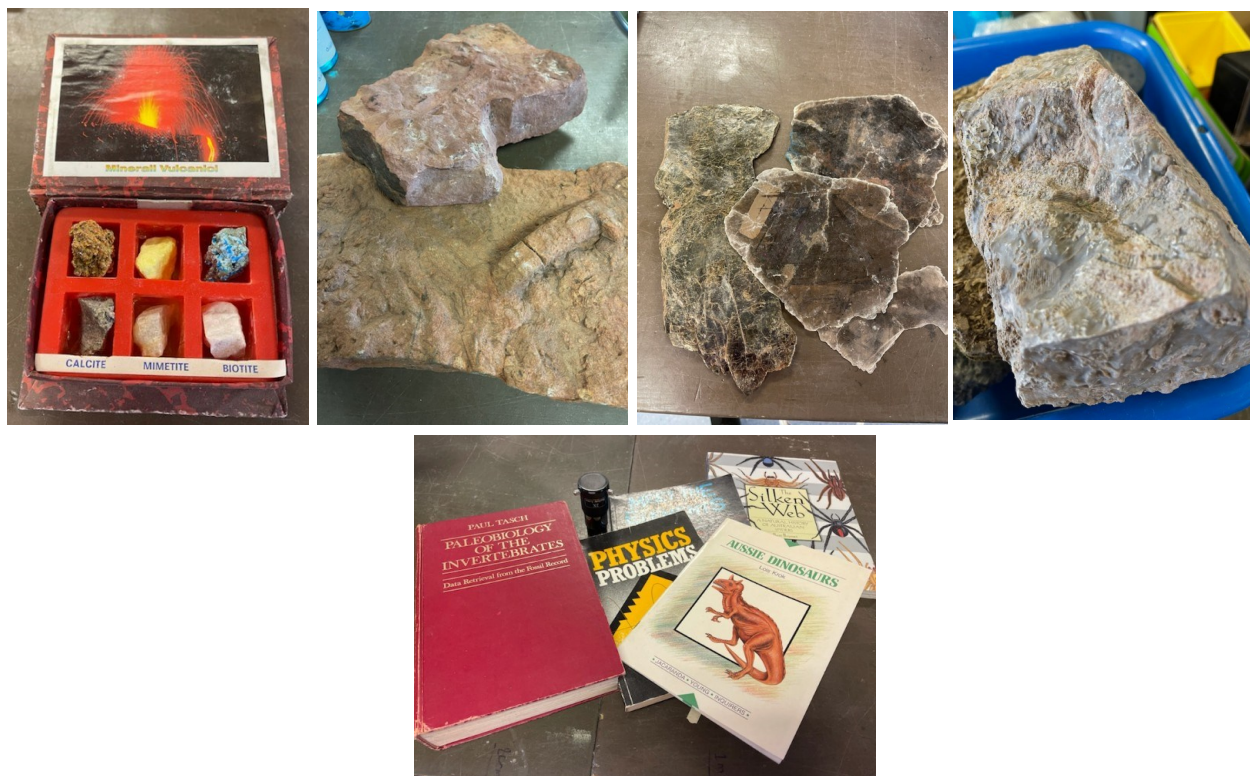

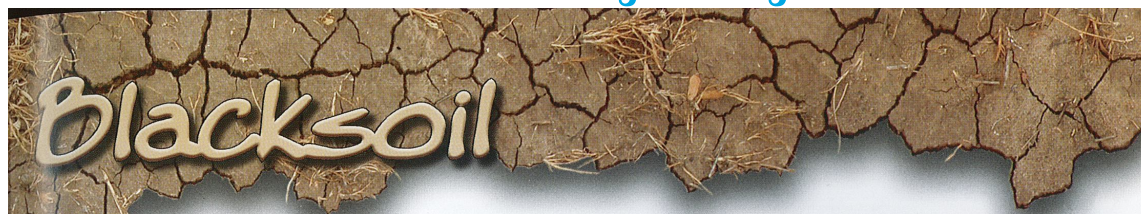

The Cone from Ulladulla

In the 1970s, I was a geology lecturer in the State College of Victoria. On a collecting trip in 1976, my wife Pamela and I stayed at Ulladulla on the southern New South Wales coast and visited the Permian Marine beds there. These deposits are exposed in the rock platforms and cliffs along the coastline of the area and our aim was to get some shelly Permian fossils for the State College.

On the shoreline, we found that a channel had been freshly blasted through a wave-cut rock platform that consisted of fairly barren looking grey sandstone. We investigated the muck-pile created by the blasting. It was definitely a marine deposit, and we found brachiopods and other shelly fossils sparsely distributed throughout it. The area appeared as though it must have once been a broad, flat, shallow beach environment but the surprising thing was we were finding fossil fragments preserved as coal in the blasted rock. I had visited Ulladulla many times before and had never seen any coal material – coal would not survive at all in the environment of a wave-cut rock platform, and would very quickly disintegrate. Apparently, it was only the fresh blasting that had revealed it.

Pam and I simultaneously called out that we had found something, and came together carrying our prize finds. Amazingly, our two bits of rock, which had been separated in the blast, fitted together like a jigsaw. The resulting fossil we first identified as a little stingray, then a horseshoe crab – but the material was coal! There were lots of scraps of plant material, preserved as coal, scattered through the grey sandstone. Obviously the area had once been a beach, with plant remnants being washed into the sea and carried back by the waves, the same as we see today – flotsam and jetsam.

Soon after our return from Ulladulla, I heard of a short course in palaeobotany being held at the University of New England and attended it, bringing the fossil with me. The participating palaeobotanists were quite enthusiastic about the specimen and identified it as a large sphenopsid cone, belonging to a giant club moss. For my own reference, I informally named it *Pamelopsis ulladullensis* after Pamela and the town of Ulladulla.

I did some research on '*Pamelopsis*' at the time, and was convinced that it was a species previously not described. However, my studies were disrupted soon after when I left my job at the State College following its decision to discontinue offering Geology. I worked for a couple of years as a chemist in Fiji, but came back to palaeontology work under Dr Malcolm Walter (now Professor Walter, based at Macquarie University), in the Baas Becking laboratory, run jointly by CSIRO and the Bureau of Mineral Resources in Canberra. My research there was investigating the base of the Cambrian, with fieldwork in central Australia. It was

very far removed from Permian plants, and *Pamelopsis* was left lying in our shed.

I have been unable to find my original notes, including a newspaper clipping with a photo of the fossil that was published about 1976. They have not been tossed out, just very well put away somewhere. I retired in 2003, but am now working as a 'recycled' science teacher in Longreach, Queensland. In the meantime, I have searched the web (not possible in 1976). Google gave 1,940 references for 'Sphenopsid,' 457 for 'Permian Sphenopsid' and 97 for 'Sphenopsid cone Permian Australia', with only five mentioning the Sydney Basin. There were also 275 entries for the Mesozoic Sphenopsids which continued to form a significant part of land flora, but as large 'horsetails' rather than 'club mosses'.

Given the ephemeral nature of coal in a wave-cut platform environment, I can only marvel at how lucky we were to find this beautiful specimen. It was found solely because we visited within a couple of days of the blasting. Next time we visited, a sewer main had been laid in the trench and then concreted over. We could find no trace of any coal fossils in the exposed rock platform.

All Love Bites programming takes a strength-based approach and views young people as active participants who are able to make choices for themselves and their relationships when supported with information and opportunity for skill development.

- Love Bites education is focused on three critical areas for learning:
- Knowledge: youth-led collaborative learning
- Attitudes: critical thinking and decision-making and
- Behaviours: problem solving and communication skills

The overall aims of the programming are to equip young people with the knowledge needed to have respectful relationships, encourage and develop their skills in critical thinking and assist them in being able to problem solve and communicate effectively. When equipped in these areas, NAPCAN believes that young people can make the right choices for themselves and their relationships that are free from violence and abuse.

Year 10 and 11 will be involved in this program later this term.

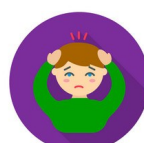
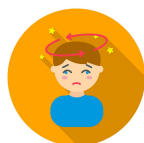
