Peading at home

Parents and carers tend to read aloud to their children when they are young and give up when they are older. The belief holds that once children are old enough to read by themselves parents and carers are no longer needed or wanted. A recent report has blown this idea out of the water.

Scholastic surveyed a collection of young people, and the results were surprising. In fact 83% of young people across all age groups said they wish their parents still read aloud to them. This is something that we see at school on a daily basis, where many teachers read to their classes, in both English lessons and IVY lessons. Not only is it something that kids enjoy, it is also good for them.

One benefit relates to the time they spend with their parent or carer, but it also increases vocabulary, their own reading confidence and their ability to read aloud with expression and fluency. When they share the reading they also increase their abilities in public speaking and lift their performance at school!

Another obvious benefit of this practice is that the students become more interested in reading for pleasure and the OECD says that kids who read for pleasure do better in their school work. While teachers may seem to be the best placed to teach children to read and help them to understand texts, parents are the best people to show them that reading can be fun.

So no matter how old your young person may be, it's never too late to rediscover the magic of reading together!

Congratulations also goes out to all the students who swam, encouraged, motivated, and assisted on the day. Without your enthusiasm and participation, carnivals like this would not exist.







Best Start Assessment

Year 7 students will participate in the Best Start Year 7 Assessment in Term 1, 2022.

Best Start Year 7 is an online literacy and numeracy assessment available to secondary schools that assesses key literacy skills of Year 7 students. It is designed to assist teachers to identify students who may require additional support in developing their literacy and numeracy skills.

The 2022 assessment window is:

2 February to 4 March 2022

The purpose of the Best Start Year 7 assessment is to provide feedback to teachers to help identify students needs. Feedback will be provided to teachers who may choose to share this with students, parents and carers during teacher interview processes.

Best Start Year 7 is just one of a range of assessments the school uses to assess students.

Please inform the school if your child has special needs requiring support to complete an online assessment.

Optional advice:

Students will be asked to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a computer to enable them to hear audio during the assessment. Earbuds used for mobile phones or other portable devices.

MSW School Vaccinations

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2022 the following vaccines will be offered:

Year 7

Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine - 2-doses at least 6 months apart Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine - Single dose

Years 10

Meningococcal ACWY vaccine - Single dose

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that, to improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses during Year 7 or 8 (for HPV and dTpa vaccination) and during Year 10 or 11 (for Meningococcal ACWY vaccination) or consent signed in 2021.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website.

A Record of Vaccination card will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Details about vaccinations given at school will also be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to support complete vaccination histories.

Peminders

- Enrolment / Student Forms Thank you to those parents who have already returned their forms, if you have not, can you please return these by Monday 21st February
- School starts at 9am. It is expected students are at school by then. School concludes at 3.25pm.
- Should a student need to leave school during the day it should be for a valid reason. They need to bring a note from home and present it to the Deputy Principal before school. Phone calls to the office should only be used in emergency situations. Phone calls and texts on a student phone will never be accepted. This includes during sport.
- Phones The school has a very strict policy on phone use in the school. Phones are never to be used in class unless under the direct supervision of the teacher and then only for educational purposes. If a student is using their phone in class they will be given a direction to turn it off and put it away. If the student doesn't put their phone away they will be directed to take their phone to be locked up at the front office for the remainder of the day. Continual offenders may have to have their phone collected by parents.
- Contacting your student If you would like to contact your student, please either call them during break times or contact the front office to leave a message. Please do not call or message your student during class time as they will not be able to answer it.
- Basic everyday uniform is a school shirt and navy shorts (not black). Jeans, jean shorts, and leggings are not uniform and are not to be worn to school. Inappropriate clothing, including revealing items or those with inappropriate logos and slogans are not acceptable. Parents will be called to bring up appropriate alternate clothing or take students home.
- Absences Parents are required to explain students absences on the day of their return. This could be by directly replying to the SMS from the school, phoning the school or sending a note with an explanation.
- Returning Permission Notes Parents and students are reminded that notes and money must be returned on or before the date specified, or your child will not be allowed to attend the excursion. Payment plans may be put in place in special circumstances, but must be organised ahead of time.
- If your student is sick In accordance with NSW Health, parents and carers are reminded NOT to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-life symptoms.



Unwell or have COUD?

Unwell at School

Any student or staff member who is unwell and/or displays symptoms of COVID-19 will be asked to go home and stay until they can complete a RAT or PCR test.

- If symptoms continue, they should stay at home and take another RAT in 24 hours or have a PCR test.
- If the second RAT or initial PCR test result is negative and they are displaying no symptoms OR they are diagnosed as another condition such as hayfever, the student or staff member can return to school.
 - If a student or staff member receives a positive RAT result, they need to:
 - record the positive RAT result through the Service NSW website or Service NSW app
 - notify the school of the positive RAT or PCR result as soon as possible
 - follow NSW Health advice to isolate for 7 days.
 - Your student can return to school after the 7 days as long as they have no systems, you will need to provide the clearance letter from the NSW Health.

Negative results do not need to be reported to Service NSW or to the school.
