ANT Merino Wether Challenge

Murrumburrah High School set off in late August with a team of six wether hoggets that we have been looking after since March to compete against over 50 schools (Government/Independent and Catholic) across the entire state.

Each participating school was given six balloted animals from Egelabra Merino Stud – Warren NSW. Senior Students completing Agriculture or Primary Industries were given the opportunity to break in these young wethers and ensure all the dietary and health needs were met by our Farm Assistant, teachers and students. In short, these wethers were pampered to perform to their optimum ability.

Being the first time MHS was able to venture up to Dubbo to compete in this challenge, we found we had lots to pick up as we went, as the process is quite different to showing cattle or prime lambs.

However, our small team of three students, Ellie Ward, April Drew and Bonnie Abnett, amazed the other schools and appeared as if they had been doing this type of showing all their life. The girls also had the extra challenge of showing Cootamundra High School's wethers as their teacher was on maternity leave.

At the end of the 3 days, we arrived back in Harden, and the results from the judging on the hoof and on the hook started to come through the Facebook site.

The girls and the wethers had just managed to take out first place in the Wool Value category in the Wheat districts, as well as first place in the whole state overall with a combined value of \$170.11 for six months wool growth.

In addition, we were amazed at taking out the Restocker Value category in the Wheat districts as well as first across the entire state with a value of \$580.00 - \$115 above our nearest competitor.

This continues to show that Murrumburrah High School can compete against all other schools in the state and still manage to win awards through their efforts and dedication to the competition. Well done Murrumburrah High School.

This provided students with a chance to see what options are available and ask any questions.






Food Technology





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Unwell or have COUD?

Unwell / Testing

Staff and students cannot attend school if they are showing any symptoms of COVID-19. If symptoms occur at any time, your child should not attend school and should undertake a rapid antigen test (RAT).

For positive COVID-19 cases

Staff, students and visitors who have tested positive to COVID-19 must:

- complete 5 days of isolation from the date they tested positive
- be symptom-free before returning to school, if symptoms remain after Day 5 they must continue following NSW Health guidelines to self-isolate and undertake a rapid antigen test (RAT)
- complete a RAT and return a negative result before attending school on Days 6 and 7 after testing positive to COVID-19, and
- wear a mask on Days 6 and 7 when attending school.

Household/close contacts attending school

- They must notify the school.
- They should conduct a daily RAT and return a negative result each morning before attending school for 5 school days.
- They must wear a mask indoors except when eating or exercising.
