From the Principal

Winter has arrived......

A bit sooner than we had hoped for, but the cooler weather has rolled in, and we are putting our new heating system to very good use. It looks like we are in for a long winter this year. Positive Connections



Pecipe - Pumpkin Soup with Croutons

¼ butternut pumpkin

½ brown onion

3 cloves of garlic

300ml vegetable stock

salt and pepper

3 tsp vegetable oil

50ml cream

1 bread roll

¼ cup shredded cheese

2 tb margarine

Method

- 1. Peel and dice pumpkin into large cubes
- 2. Peel and roughly chop onion, dice garlic
- 3. In a heavy bottomed pot, sauté vegetables in oil for 5 mins or until lightly coloured
- 4. Add 2 cloves garlic cook for a further minute
- 5. Add stock, simmer for 10-15 mins or until vegetables are tender. Add sage leaves.
- 6. Cut bread roll, mix margarine with remaining garlic, spread on roll. Top with cheese grill in the oven for 3 to 5 mins
- 7. Remove soup from heat, add cream, season with salt and pepper and puree with blender or stick blender.
- 8. Serve in a warmed bowl with crouton on side

What's happening in Careers? Metals Immersion Program



Peer Peading






